Why Scholarships Matter?

Scholarships provide an opportunity for many people to earn an education. Without assistance from an outside source, students may have trouble paying for the degree they need in order to enter the workforce and become a contributing member of society. Scholarships matter for many reasons. Here are just a few of the top benefits.

1. Scholarships make education easier to access - the average debt for the class of 2018 is \$29,800. No one should have their education limited for lack of income. Scholarships can help some of our needy students see how they can achieve a college degree. Tuition at SWOCC is \$102/credit while cost at PSU is \$10,386 for 2021 according to Nicole Fossum, one of our scholarship winners.

Nikki Adrienne Wright received the first Patty J. Barton Scholarship from our Coos Bay Area Zonta Service Foundation in August 2020. The \$20,000 award is sent to the student's college of choice each quarter as they verify their grade point, provide two letters from professors and a brief personal letter updating their status. Zonta, with the help of Patty's husband Jon Barton and many generous donors, is proud to remember and honor our long time member Patty with this scholarship. The purpose of this award is to recognize a student who demonstrates tenacity and focus as she rebuilds her life coming from significant challenges.

Nikki graduated from Myrtle Point High School in 2002 as Senior Class President, VP of FFA Chapter and member of several sports teams throughout high school. With no encouragement or support at the time for going to college,

she dove right into the workforce. This gave her the freedom to move out of her family home and start a better life on her own. By age 22, she was married and had a beautiful daughter. She continued to work and support her family.

Nikki says her life began to slowly change in 2013 when she started working for the court system. Most of the people she encountered had secondary education and her curiosity blossomed. She said "I really found the inspiration to continue my education when I began working with Judge Megan Jacquot in the Juvenile Dependency system." Nikki could relate to the children and the families coming together to overcome odds and obstacles.

So began Nikki's pursuit of a Bachelor of Science Degree in Criminal Justice at SWOCC and Portland State University (PSU). She expects to graduate June 2024. Currently she is enrolled in Spring Term at SWOCC completing her transfer degree and carrying 12 credits while working full-time. She has been accepted at PSU for Fall Term 2021 in the Criminology and Criminal Justice Program.

We look forward to hearing more about Nikki's accomplishments. I remember these words in her essay: "I want to continue my education to become a bigger part of the dependency system, to enact change and hold agencies accountable for getting these children home, and our families back together." Patty would be happy to help and Zonta is here to help for her.

The two times I received Zonta scholarships while in pharmacy school, I was very appreciative! With the rising costs of education, particularly in professional programs, it is near impossible to afford the education without significant debt, even with working full time during school. The scholarships helped me to minimize my student loans to focus on my education instead of worrying about finances or reaching out to other private lenders to make ends meet.

Following graduation from the OSU/Oregon Health and Science University College of Pharmacy as a Doctor of Pharmacy in 2019, I moved to Las Vegas to pursue a pharmacy residency. I completed my first year of pharmacy residency at the University Medical Center of Southern Nevada, also obtaining a nationally recognized teaching certificate during that year from the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists. I am currently in my second year of pharmacy residency, specializing in infectious diseases pharmacy, at MountainView Hospital.



Highlights of this residency year thus far include obtaining board certification as a pharmacotherapy specialist, publication as a textbook chapter author on treatment of helminthic infections, creation of protocols at my facility that allow pharmacists to place patients on the most appropriate antibiotic therapy in certain circumstances, speaking nationally with the American College of Clinical Pharmacy about a new treatment for infectious diarrhea in children that is more efficacious than the previous standard of care, and being a primary author on what I anticipate to be the most comprehensive review article to date on a new antibiotic coming to the United States later this year that will play a significant role in allowing patient's infections to be treated at home with this oral antibiotic instead of being hospitalized or receiving intravenous antibiotics at home. Just recently I learned that my research on antibiotic dosing in obese surgical patients has been accepted to present at the American College of Clinical Pharmacy Virtual Research Symposium. This is a very big deal for my career opportunities.

At the end of my residency at MountainView Hospital, I will be staying on as the Infectious Diseases pharmacist and residency program coordinator for the post-graduate year two (PGY-2) infectious diseases residency program. This will encompass teaching teams of pharmacy students, eight first-year pharmacy residents, and a second-year pharmacy resident, as well as lectures at the medical residency program regarding antibiotic use and general pharmacy and hospital staff anti-infective education.

Once again, I'm truly grateful for the Zonta Club assisting me in reaching my career goals and where I am today by assisting with my educational expenses in pharmacy school.


