# North American Inter-District Meeting Challenges and Opportunities for Zonta's Second Century

The North American Districts/Clubs of Zonta International hold an Inter-District meeting on the odd-numbered years, typically in June. This year's "NAIDM" was held in Cincinnati, OH, hosted by clubs in District 5. The awesome thing about this year was that it was a hybrid conference, in that one could attend in person by traveling to Cincinnati, or one could register to attend the conference virtually. I chose to do that and spent Friday, Saturday and Sunday morning (June 25, 26 & 27) on my computer listening and participating in virtual breakout sessions on all things Zonta. It was insightful, educational, and inspirational - worth the early mornings of logging in at 5:30 AM due to the time zone difference.

The sessions offered Leadership Training, an Advocacy training opportunity for how North American Clubs can legislate for ZI's global signature project of Ending Child Marriage, breakout sessions that included how to recruit members virtually, how to increase diversity, equality and inclusion in our clubs, and how to partner with likeminded organizations for service and fundraising. The keynote speaker at the Saturday evening session was Kathyrn Sullivan, former NASA Astronaut who was the first woman to walk in space AND the first woman to dive in one of the world's deepest part of the oceans. She also became the Administrator of NOAA after being confirmed by the Senate in 2014. A very accomplished and inspirational woman of our modern day!

There were two sessions that were aimed at Zonta members specifically which are important to our membership and to the advancement of the Zonta organization as we begin our second century.

The first session was an open forum with Zonta International President Sharon Langenbeck speaking to all attendees, (in person and virtual) addressing two Resolutions (Res. #2 and Res. #3) which will be up for a vote at the International Convention in Hamburg, Germany next July. In a nutshell, Zonta leadership at the international level is "taking the pulse" of our organization. President Sharon said that this is the best time to review Zonta International - at the beginning of our "next 100 years". What is the vision? Where are we going and how will we get there? "This is a time to reflect".

A survey will be sent out to ALL members sometime soon asking each member to share their thoughts in four (4) areas: Strategy, Governance, Advocacy & Service, and Membership. The survey should only take 5-10 minutes to complete. Every members' participation is IMPORTANT - as Zonta International leadership is looking to develop a new strategic plan for how we govern ourselves, how we are structured, what we want this organization to become as we move into our second century. We'll be hearing more on this survey and the two potentially transformative resolutions in the coming weeks. I'll try to keep you all apprised of what's to come. The second session was titled "What's New in Zonta?" Again, President Sharon and ZI Treasure Mari McKenzie along with staff from Zonta Headquarters - our Executive Director Allison Summers and Ass't Director Megan Radavich - spoke for over an hour highlighting new changes that have been implemented recently - much already available on the ZI website. - Welcome to Zonta booklet newly updated and improved. A must have for your new members and potential members.
- Remarkable Women series talks with remarkable women these can be viewed live through a registration process from the ZI website OR watch the recorded version.
- New Member Orientation Webinar this is very popular and has gotten great feedback. Check it out!
- Membership Campaign/Add your Voice This is an on-going campaign to help with membership recruitment.
- Foundation Name Change what used to be Zonta International Foundation (ZIF) is now Zonta Foundation for Women
- ZI's official statement on Climate Change and how that impacts women personally. ZI plans to have a webinar available on this topic and ZI's statement in September hosted by the International Advocacy Committee.
- New Toolkits available (or soon to be available) for clubs and committees on ZI website Zonta Says No (coming in September), Communications, Membership, and more! Again check it out!

- Elevator Speech Campaign ZI will be asking all clubs to submit their "Elevator Speech" as part of a campaign for pr purposes
- Data Privacy a data cleanup project will be coming soon for all members to help with updating their information on the members data base. Each member will be notified of this project and asked to make necessary updates.
- Areas of concern include declining membership and losing clubs. ZI recently lost Russia as a member country due to political pressure; Turkey and Hong Kong are experiencing similar pressure. ZI will be conducting a Membership Efficiency Study and will gain info from membership as well as non-Zonta organizations


President Sharon also noted that the International Convention in Hamburg will look a bit different that what we've experienced from recent conventions.

## Let Us Learn Madagascar



DID YOU KNOW. . .in the 2018 UNICEF report more than 125,000 children in all public lower secondary schools have benefitted from sports equipment and learning materials. In addition, a sports field was built as part of the construction project at Marolinta secondary school with the support of Zonta International.

So, what do we know about "Let Us Learn Madagascar" well, one is that between 2016 and 2020 Zonta International (that's us) contributed US \$2,000,000 to UNICEF USA to support this project and in 2020 Zonta International announced an additional commitment of \$500,000 (US). Why? 1) to ensure that more children, particularly girls (who drop out at higher levels in post-primary level) have access to post-primary education and stay in school. 2) To ensure that Madagascar's education system has the capacity to offer quality teaching for enhanced learning outcomes. Some expected outcomes for the years 2020-2022 . . .

- Around 100 children will learn in two new classrooms, which will be complete with latrines, a water point, and equipment
- o 100 Principals will be trained.
- o 750 households will benefit from conditional cash transfers.
- 114 children's clubs will be established to implement plans of action to raise awareness in their schools and communities about the issues of violence
- 1,600 children at risk and victims of violence and exploitation in schools and communities will benefit from medical, legal, or social support.

with her education.

Jasmine was born in Los Angeles, CA moving to Coos Bay at the age of eight. She graduated from Marshfield High School in 2017 and enrolled at Southwestern Oregon Community College, where she is a nursing student. As a Mexican American first-generation college student, Spanish was her first language. Jasmine learned English at age four. Upon graduation from SOCC in 2022, her plan is to enroll at Oregon Health Sciences University to pursue her goal of becoming a nurse practitioner. Her long-term place is to remain in Coos County working in the field of mental health.

Jasmine lives with and helps support her family in Coos Bay. Attending nursing school and working during COVID has been a challenge for Jasmine, but her great work ethic and resilience have helped her make it through. Jasmine was an active member of the Z Club at Marshfield and the Golden Z Club at SOCC. Paula Bechtold, advisor for the MHS Z Club, said "Jasmine was a great help and diligent worker for all our Z Club service projects and activities."

In Jasmine's application, she wrote "I believe cultural awareness and advocacy is essential knowledge for a nurse to have...Being culturally aware can create a more inclusive and equitable healthcare system." It is a joy to offer our support to Jasmine Herrera on her education journey and we look forward to watching her many accomplishments and contributions to our community in the years ahead.
