

125 Kids in Coos, 33 kids in Curry County, but we like to do gifts for every kid in the household, even our biological kids! So we hit at around 200 kids.

Typically, we give teens gift cards as they are the most difficult to buy for. We usually purchase those with association funds. Between Coos and Curry we have 50 teens in care.

We're sending out a survey to foster parents this week to get a more accurate idea of needs for toys and I can update you when that data comes in. I did notice last year that we ran short of toys for the 10-12 year old kids if folks want to concentrate on those.

For now, here's a list of general items that are great for building our family boxes.

Family gift boxes needs:

1. Individualized snacks - Chips, cookies, gummy bears, etc. We like to have a few of these in the box for every child.

- 2. Craft kits and painting sets for kids/families
- 3. Family Games
- 4. Fidget toys
- 5. Kids books
- 6. Family movies DVD

We could also use some help building boxes and during the event.

Event date is December 11th from 10am-Noon; volunteers to be there by 9am. Gift box packing day is will likely be the week before, we are still working on the date. We're doing the drive-through event at Hauser Community Church again as they have that wonderful, covered area! **We'd love to have our Zonta team there again this year**!
