President Alissa's Message Hello ALL!

I wanted to start with a story, I am sure many of you have heard before. It's an account of Margaret Mead, the renowned anthropologist, explaining to a student how we can define the dawn of civilization.

"Years ago, the anthropologist Margaret Mead was asked by a student what she considered to be the first sign of civilization in a culture. The student expected Mead to talk about clay pots, tools for hunting, grinding-stones, or religious artifacts.

But no. Mead said that the first evidence of civilization was a 15,000 years old fractured femur found in an archaeological site. A femur is the longest bone in the body, linking hip to knee. In societies without the benefits of modern medicine, it takes about six weeks of rest for a fractured femur to heal. This particular bone had been broken and had healed.

Mead explained that in the animal kingdom, if you break your leg, you die. You cannot run from danger, you cannot drink or hunt for food. Wounded in this way, you are meat for your predators. No creature survives a broken leg long enough for the bone to heal. You are eaten first.

A broken femur that has healed is evidence that another person has taken time to stay with the fallen, has bound up the wound, has carried the person to safety and has tended them through recovery. A healed femur indicates that someone has helped a fellow human, rather than abandoning them to save their own life.

"Helping someone else through difficulty is where civilization starts," Margaret Mead said, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; For, indeed, that's all who ever have."

I found this incredibly inspiring this week as I have been overcoming my own challenges. My wish is that it can inspire you too. We are an amazing group of intelligent, funny and strong people who are lifting up women in our community because we understand the value of fellowship. In order to be the force of change and evolution, we need each other. I am feeling very optimistic about the direction our Club is going and I am grateful for all the time and effort that you all put forth. Our next big event is LUNAFEST and we are in a great position to make this a fruitful and fun event. With your help, we'll knock it out of the park.

EMERGENCY SHELTER PROGRAM

Our emergency shelter program includes two dedicated shelter advocates as well as all utilities, food, hygiene items, and all other costs associated with operating two emergency shelters. This program amounted to 38% of our total yearly expense.

\$140,000.00

OUTREACH PROGRAM

Our outreach program includes one full-time housing advocate, housing search assistance, support groups, our crisis hotline, and court and legal advocacy. These items amounted to 27% of our yearly expense.



\$84,250.00 OPERATIONS, ADMIN &

FUNDRAISING

Our operations and admin costs are kept as low as possible and include overhead and administrative items. We also include our minimal fundraising expense in this category. These items amounted to 16.5% of our total yearly expense.

\$63,000.00 CLIENT ASSISTANCE

Financial aid payments made on behalf of survivors and emergency services amounted to 12% of our yearly expense.

CAMPUS PROGRAM

Our campus program includes a dedicated parttime campus advocate, emergency services for survivors, and campus sexual assault awareness activities and training. Located on the SWOCC Campus, this program amounted to 6.5% of our total yearly expense. survivors and holding perpetrators accountable, and to providing our agency with the strong leadership, oversight, and support that is needed to successfully operate a non-profit. We could not do our life-saving work without this amazing group of people supporting our agency, our advocates, and our dreams for the future. Thank you to all of our dedicated Board Members!

This is the 36th year of the Shore Acres Holiday Lights! The first year began with about 1,000 lights and now has over 325,000 lights. The concept was initiated by Shirley and David Bridgham of North Bend, and they are still the main brains of the organization. Visitors visit the park from all over the world. The last year the lights were open was 2019, and the records show approximately 75,000 people visited the park that year. The lights run every day from Thanksgiving night through New Year's Eve. The park is a walk-through park so visitors of all ages can stroll at their leisure. There is a garden house where free hot cider, coffee and cookies are served. This is where our members volunteer. Our Zonta Club is scheduled to work Sunday December 11 from 6:45 -9:30. This is a fun job for our members. You get to see and visit with friends from our local area as well as meet and visit with others from all over.

We need at least 6 people, preferably 8-10 people to work during the shift. We will be serving the refreshments, as well as staffing the sign in table for the guests. The upstairs bedrooms need a volunteer in each of the 2 rooms and it's nice to have 2-4 people outside "patrolling" the grounds." A sign is hung at the sign in desk that states the name of the organization that is volunteering each shift as generally there are two different shifts a day. This gives the group a lot of recognition. Often the people at the sign in table get to tell the story of their organization.

The parking for volunteers is in the back area behind the garden house. There will be a sign stating the parking area for volunteers. The is no fee to park there, but if you come through the main park entrance (**which we do NOT want you to do**) there is a \$5 fee.

As a general point of information, this year the Oregon State Parks (who we work through) is instituting a "TIMED ENTRANCE" policy into the holiday lights. For more information go to www.shoreacres.net to find out more information on how this works. We've not had it before this year so we will all be learning at the same time, how this works for us. This is another reason we need our volunteers to park in the designated parking for them.

District 8 and Area 4 News – Zonta Scholarship at Pearson College

I am pleased to announce that this year's Zonta scholar is Silvia Lungu from Moldova! Pearson College is one of 18 United World Colleges. It's come to my attention that many are not familiar with the Zonta scholarship at Pearson- so here's the nutshell version.

District 8 has a long history of supporting a female student at Pearson. Initially it was a Colombian student and we actually pooled our monies to make a scholarship. Then, the US clubs began contributing towards an endowment fund while the Canadian clubs sent scholarship monies- and the two together (scholarship plus interest on endowment) formed a scholarship. Somewhere in there, we hit a year with no Colombian female student, so Pearson asked if we might agree to an Eastern European student. This is working well now



that we are ALL contributing to the endowment and not providing direct scholarship monies.

You see, the interest on the endowment can't fully support a student, so Pearson finds a student whose national committee can support the rest of the student's funding. Right now- the Zonta Endowment sits at \$530,142.21... Pearson tells me they use 4% as a proxy for what all endowments generate- so about \$21k. I believe this is about 40% of what it costs to go to Pearson for a year... so Zonta is providing 40% of the scholarship and other funding (e.g. national committee) kicks in the other 60%. Still, we like to make a "thing" and call the student the "Zonta Scholar"!



We've had a wide variety of Zonta Scholars from Bulgaria, Georgia, Czech Republic, Slovakia, Romania, Hungary, Albania, Poland. So far as I know, we've never had Moldova before! OK I admit I had to pull up a map to see where Moldova is, and just in case anyone is as geographically challenged as I am ~ the pale blue arrow in the picture below; and assorted other scholars from the past.
