Coos County Chief Deputy District Attorney Jody Newby grew up in a small town in Alaska. Known to be an argumentative child, she was often told she should become a lawyer, a career suggestion she rejected. Now she is poised to seek the position of Coos County District Attorney in 2024, when current DA Paul Frasier retires. If elected she would become the first female district attorney in Coos County history. Jody says her passion is helping survivors of domestic violence and sexual abuse navigate the criminal justice system. To this end she has developed a classroom program to teach our local law enforcement areas of the law she believes are missing from the current curriculum at the police academy, such as understanding trauma and delayed response when

working with victims and survivors of domestic and sexual assault. Jody fits the Zonta Rose Day theme of being an inspirational individual and champion of gender equality.

In Your Home Tea Party

I was born in Portland, Oregon. When I was young, my single mother moved us to Virginia where I grew up in a suburb of Washington D.C. My childhood was not conventional. I was raised in what some might consider a religious cult. That experience certainly is nothing I would ever choose to live again, but it did shape my heart for equality, social justice, and empowerment of women.

My husband Joe, and I moved to Coos Bay 5 years ago. We have “fur” children in the form of 2 cats, Ike and Willy. He is an attorney for The Oregon Law Center. I am a nurse. I received my ADN from Walla Walla Community College and my BSN from Boise State University. I have had many fun, rewarding adventures in nursing but my latest is being the ICU Clinical Manager at Bay Area Hospital.

I had never heard of Zonta until living in Coos Bay. I saw Zonta posts on Facebook. I was intrigued by empowering women and ending gender-based violence. I am a DV survivor. I’ve had a lot of privilege in my life and was able to get out of an abusive relationship fairly easily. I honor and want to give back to those that do not and did not have privilege.

Genelle reached out to me after my inquiry and the rest is (recent) history! I look forward to getting more involved and working with all the amazing people in this group!



## Marshfield High School Z Club Updates - Paula Bechtold Advisor

The club had been busily gathering donations from the community for a silent auction to accompany a **spaghetti feed** (with music by the Marshfield jazz band). Proceeds were to be donated to Every Child and Foster Love for support of foster kids, particularly those aging out. The MHS Key Club was responsible for the spaghetti, but unfortunately had not yet done sufficient planning or organizing to satisfy the school administration (let alone the health department), **so the event has been postponed for now**. We are hopeful that it can be rescheduled for some time in May.

In the interim, the club will be finalizing their Community 101 project. Grant applications were received from AYA, Devereux Center, Friends of Coos County Public Health, HIV Alliance, and Waterfall. The focus this year is on substance abuse, prevention, and treatment. The club will hear brief presentations from each program, review each application carefully, and then determine how to allocate the \$5,000 the club received from the Oregon Community Foundation. The deadline for the club’s decision is April 27.




I was born at the Keizer hospital in North Bend. I've lived in North Bend all my life; lived, worked, raised a family, enjoying grandkids! I grew up poor, but with an amazing and supportive family and neighborhood. My father worked in the mills, where he was injured badly and couldn't work. I remember my friends being jealous because my dad was always around. He was a sweet, wonderful man. My mom worked so very hard to make sure we were loved, fed, and had a good roof over our heads. She was tough, loving, and protective of her family. She taught me to see the beauty of family and nature. We didn't have many luxuries, but we were wealthy with love. I have a bachelor's degree in human services management, which I obtained in 2012 from the University of Phoenix. It was a great experience learning with people from all around our nation and being instructed by people who were all working as specialists in the fields they taught.

Tammy (Dalton also a Zonta member) and I have been together for almost 40 years! We've been married for 37.5 of those years. We've raised 3 wonderful children, who are all wonderful adults now. We have 4 of the most amazing grandchildren.

I've done a lot of things over the years. I've worked in the woods (logging, tree planting), as a fish farmer, removed asbestos for a living, was a golf course superintendent, worked public housing maintenance, managed a doughnut shop, and most recently (for the last 12 years) have volunteered and worked for CASA. I've been the director for CASA of Coos and Curry Counties for about 8 years. CASA is a program of Oregon Coast Community Action; an organization I am proud to be part of and proud of the good work we do in our communities.

One of my life challenges was an onset of Rheumatoid Arthritis, which cause a big disruption in my job at the time as a maintenance mechanic for North Bend Housing Authority. There were days I struggled to turn a doorknob, which made the rest of my job very difficult. The blessing, silver lining, was that it led to going to college and working for ORCCA and CASA.



Another big challenge for me was addressing and healing through toxic masculinity and learning to carry an equity mindset. I am learning every day to be a better human, man, and advocate by digging deep into my own ignorance, toxic programming, and oppressive behaviors. I've been so fortunate and privileged to have met some amazing people along my journey. Those amazing people have opened my eyes to reality, injustice, and the need for advocacy. I believe all children need to be safe, loved, and nurtured. I'd love to see myself out of a job. Given a second wish – end oppression, rebuild our systems and foundations that were created inequitably and rebuild them so they support the needs of all humans.

#### Why Zonta?

I eagerly joined Zonta because of the mission and the support CASA received from the club over the years and the work the local, district, and national Zontians do for women and children in our world. There are so many strong women role models I have I have had a privilege to know, work with, and help make change in our community. Zonta has been an amazing experience and I have learned so much from all members of this club.
