Clara Zetkin

Do you know Clara Zetkin? I didn't until I started doing research to write this month's article. A bit of a history lesson about International Woman's Day (IWD). Did you know that IWD's hasn't always been celebrated March 8th?

German activist Clara Zetkin inspired the International Socialist Congress to create an international version of the US holiday and on March 19, 1911, the first IWD was held in Austria, Denmark, Germany and Switzerland with more than 1 million people attending rallies. In 1921, IWD was officially moved to March 8, to honor women in Petrograd (St Petersburg) Russia who staged a strike to protest food shortages and poor living conditions. This strike helped give rise to the Russian Revolution of 1917, which eventually led to the abdication of Nicholas II. This year's IWD campaign is "Accelerate Action." The estimate is it will take 5 more generations for women to reach parity!!! So let us be inspired by those that came before us and channel Eleanor Roosevelt's energy!

When the fundraiser committee formed this year, Julie Reed made an excellent suggestion that we honor a local woman at our event on March 8th, International Women's Day. We developed and distributed an application which resulted in four nominations. Then the hard work of selecting one woman when all those nominated were very worthy. Below is Trish's bio written by her daughter, Emily Midyette. Emily nominated Trish – a daughter's love for her mother!

Trish McMichael was raised in Rainer, Oregon and moved to the Coos Bay area after graduating from Oregon State University with a bachelor's degree in English and a minor in European History. She quickly fell in love with the South Coast community. In her early days here, she worked at the Bay Area Chamber of Commerce and the South Coast Business Employment Corporation.

In 1995 Trish realized a lifelong dream and opened Books By The Bay. She owned the bookstore for 16 years, doubling its size, adding a coffee shop, and hosting the Readers By The Bay Book club, now 30 years old. While owning the store she was heavily involved in the community, donating thousands of dollars to local charitable organizations, hosting events, and participating in the North Bend Downtown Association. Trish was also a member of the local Jaycees, Rotary Club, and Zonta Club for many years. She helped organize the Blackberry Arts Festival and Bay Area Fun Festival. Additionally, she was a founding member of the Bay Area Hospital's Community Foundation Board. Trish was heavily involved in her children's school activities and organizations, co-chairing two prom committees, assisting with planning Senior All Night Parties, and assistant coaching the Lighthouse Wild Dogs soccer team.

In 2011, Trish sold the bookstore and began a new career with Southwestern Oregon Community College. She is the Senior Academic Advisor, and her primary focus is assisting students with their educational paths. In this position, she not only advises students on career choices but also connects them with community resources and scholarships and is a compassionate support as students navigate the challenges of balancing school and work. She finds her job extremely rewarding and sincerely enjoys seeing past students in the community utilizing their education.



Trish is happily married to Kyle McMichael and is the proud mother of Emily Midyette, Trey Woods, Nathan Midyette, and her French Bulldog, Gustav. In October of 2024, Trish was diagnosed with a rare and highly aggressive form of Breast Cancer. She is currently in treatment and has become an advocate for mammograms, a regular participant in local cancer support groups, and is planning a fundraiser to assist others with Breast Cancer. She intends to be a resource for local women facing the same diagnosis long into the future. Trish has always found joy in supporting people.




